Dean Jeffrey Cohen



Dr. Jeffrey Cohen is the dean of humanities in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Arizona State University. His research examines strange and beautiful things that challenge the imagination, phenomena that seem alien and intimate at once. He is especially interested in what monsters, foreigners, misfits, inhuman forces, objects and matter that won't stay put reveal about the cultures that dream, fear and desire them. He is widely published in the fields of medieval studies, monster theory, posthumanism and ecocriticism. His book, "Stone: An Ecology of the Inhuman", received the 2017 Rene Wellek Prize for best book in comparative literature from the American Comparative Literature Association. In collaboration with ASU Professor Lindy Elkins – Tanton, he recently co-wrote the book "Earth", a reexamination of Earth from the perspectives of a planetary scientist and a literary humanist. Currently, he's co-writing a book titled "Noah's Arkive: Towards an Ecology of Refuge".

Director Nina Berman



Dr. Nina Berman is the Director of and a Professor in the School of International Letters and Cultures at Arizona State University. Her research areas include globalization studies, humanitarianism, tourism, German orientalism and colonialism, Germans in Africa, and intercultural hermeneutics. She has published books and articles on various questions related to German colonialism and orientalism, minority literature, disability, translation and intercultural contact, including *German Literature on the Middle East: Discourses and Practices, 1000 – 1989* (2011, Outstanding Academic Title 2012, Choice) and *Impossible Missions? German Economic, Military, and Humanitarian Efforts in Africa* (2004). Dr. Berman is presently co-editing, with Kimani Njogu and Michael M. Ndurumo, an anthology on *Disability and Social Justice in Kenya*. She is fluent in German, Arabic, French and Kiswahili.

Will the Sudanese Youth be Able to Resolve the Sudan’s Age Afro-Arab Identity Issues and Create a New Nation?”

Dr. Pamela DeLargy is a public health and population specialist who is rejoining academia after a twenty years career in international development and humanitarian response where she worked in the areas of population and development, migration, gender and development (including reproductive health). Professor DeLargy also served for a number of years in Eritria, Sudan, and Ethiopia and is a specialist on the Horn Africa, where she also did her dissertation research. Prior to joining ASU, she was Senior Advisor to the U.N. Special Representative for Migration (London) and a Visiting Fellow at the Institute for Global Affairs of the London School of Economics. Her recent research and writing is on the cross – Mediterranean migration crisis. Ms. DeLargy works closely with ASU’s Education for Humanity initiative, which seeks to bring access to higher education to camp – based and urban refugees in Lebanon, Jordan, Uganda, and Ethiopia.

Senior Policy Advisor for the Enough Project***

“The Economic Underpinnings of Sudan’s Militia State”

Dr. Suliman Baldo serves as Senior Policy Advisor for the Enough Project. Previously, Dr. Baldo directed Sudan Democracy First Group, a Sudan – focused think tank aiming to help bring about faster democratization and peace to the war torn country. Dr. Baldo held the mandate of the UN Independent Expert on the Human Rights Situation in Mali between 2013 – 2018. In 2010 and 2011, he provided expert advice to joint UN and African Union mediation teams on justice for victims of the conflict in Darfur and worked as an independent commissioner in the UN Independent Commission of Investigations into post-election violence in Cote d’Ivoire. Between 2006 and early 2013, Dr. Baldo served as director of the Africa Program at the International Center for Transitional Justice, where he oversaw six country programs that supported post-conflict transitions in Africa through justice and other institutional reforms. He served as Africa Director at the International Crisis Group from 2004 to 2006, and worked between 1995 to 2002 at Human Rights Watch as senior researcher for the Democratic Republic of Congo and the Horn of Africa. He has lectured at the University of Khartoum and worked in the humanitarian sector, first as a volunteer and later professionally, serving as director for Sudan and the Horn of Africa for Oxfam America (1988 – 1992). Dr. Baldo holds a PhD in Comparative Literature from the University of Dijon in France and undergraduate degrees from the University of Khartoum.
